

Two days after we got home we headed for Mexico. We attended the 15th birthday party of Michelle, Hugo and Sylvia's daughter. That is a big deal in Mexico. It can be bigger than a wedding. Becky an Dan, friends who bring there church down several times a year from Missouri, came down for the party, so, we all went together. It was extra special, as Becky has been very ill for a long time and it was good to see her healthy enough to make the trip. The party was beautiful and lots of fun. families and praise God that they help us and care for the camp.

We came home in time for Jan to receive recognition for her volunteer work in a pre-school class near our home. She was the volunteer of the year! We got to have a great meal, sitting with the principal of the school, in a very nice place, and having her picture taken with honored volunteers from the entire school district. She loves kids and they love her. Many children come from homes where they don't get the help and attention they need. So she is it.

Our in home Bible study will continue through the summer. Jan is also in a study of Colossians with women at our church. We have five churches coming to the camp this summer, working on different churches and doing VBS for children. We Praise God for all he has enabled us to do, and we honor Him in all our ways.

We realize that this letter is getting a little more lengthy than usual, but, while on our trip, we were asked several times about the financial health of Vamonos, so, we thought we'd take this opportunity to let you all know where we stand. Up until about 4 years ago, we were able to be in fairly good shape, as we had a lot of American groups coming to the camp, and the larger groups provided some extra money after all expenses were paid out of their camp fees. However, with the fear of violence in Mexico, the number of Americans dropped off significantly, and we have had to run the ministry purely on monthly donations to the General Fund. Five years ago, we had 650 Americans in the camp. There following year, we had 40. So, you can see the significant drop in camp income that this change produced.

In general, we receive donations that are designated in 3 separate areas..... General Operations, our personal support and Feed My Sheep.

In the area of General Operations, our usual monthly receipts amount to \$1400. We do receive additional periodic donations (particularly at year-end) that raises the monthly average to \$2400. Our usual monthly expenses are just over \$1600, so we maintain a contingency fund to cover the lower giving months. The contingency fund is also there to cover unusual unseen needs. For example, last summer we had necessary repairs to our water filtration system that cost \$2500. As of this writing, our undesignated, available balance is just under \$20,000.

Our personal support is fine. None of our support comes from the general operating budget, but is only funded by donations from folks and churches who's giving is specifically designated for our support. Several years ago, when we turned the camp over to Hugo and Sylvia, we cut our personal support way back because our day to day involvement was reduced. We currently do all financial and administrative functions from San Antonio, and provide liaison to the churches coming down on trips. We also travel to Mexico at least once a month to meet with camp staff and visit pastors with whom we work, and we try to go to the camp when there are American church groups there. So, right now, the only support we receive is \$1300 per month in housing allowance, nothing for actual salary. The remainder of our income comes from social security and investment income. Current giving to our personal support is just over \$1500.

The third area is in the Feed My Sheep fund. As we shared with you previously, because the government has begun providing breakfast to children, the pastors no longer desire the program in their churches. Because we didn't want to be forced to terminate any services, we built up a substantial contingency fund to enable us to keep programs running. However, programs ceased and

people kept giving and the fund grew to nearly \$13,000. We felt that it is poor stewardship of God's money for this to be sitting in the bank, not being used. We have spent the last couple of months in discussions with our board as asking for feedback from you all. We did not hear from many folks, but we're able to talk to several people during our travels. As a result, our board has decided to move that money from the designated Feed My Sheep fund into Children's Ministry, to be used for children as needs present themselves. We already know that several churches have needs for Sunday School materials and materials for summer projects. As more funds are donated by folks who have been giving to Feed My Sheep, those funds will be placed in Children's Ministry as well. This will enable us to use these funds on an ongoing basis, but, insure that they will be used only for children, as intended when they were donated.

If anyone else has any questions or suggestions, we would be more that eager to talk to you.
